## Report Couchiching Conservancy Taking nature's path

### **President's Message**

2011 has been a very exciting year for CC. We are in the 3rd year of our 5 Strategic Plan and have reached the following milestones:

- Surpassing 10,000 acres of property under our stewardship with the addition of almost 1,400 acres under management this year thanks in part to the tireless efforts of Ron Reid;
- Hosting another successful Carden Nature Festival with over 315 people in attendance;
- Launching a 3 year Strategic Plan for the 4,400 acre Copeland Forest with a well attended public meetings at Craighurst (over 200 enthusiastic forest users);
- Increasing our membership to 367 members (a 7% increase);
- Forming the Past President Council with a focus of establishing the Heartwood Endowment Fund that will ensure the ongoing operations of the Conservancy. To date we have \$245,000 in pledges;
- Between the Dragon Boat Race, One Wild Night and the Carden Bird Challenge we raised more than \$35,000 towards ongoing educational and stewardship programs and projects.

And, thanks to our hard working Executive Director, Mark Bisset, and his dedicated staff (Kyra, Gayle and Dorthea) we managed to do this in a fiscally responsible manner thus ending the year with a slightly positive balance sheet and more than \$46,000 in new reserves!

We could not have achieved all these successes however without the enthusiasm of all our members and volunteers, who continue to work tirelessly but with smiles on faces. I would like to give a special thanks to:

Jane Ball for doing such a great job on organizing our volunteers (180 at last count);

Gord Ball for leading the Heartwood Fund initiative;

David Kennedy for spearheading the Copeland Forest Advisory Committee;

Paul Russell and Rob Cutler for their sage financial advice.

I would also like to make notable mention of two board members who will be stepping down this year, Lou Probst and Kristi McKechnie. Lou has contributed a lot of his time and knowledge to some of our major property acquisitions and the ongoing stewardship of the Carden properties. He has provided the board with sage advice over his tenure on financial and operational policies and procedures. Kristi has shown a strong determination in her fund raising efforts and making us all more aware of the accessibility challenges that people of all ages face on a daily basis.

But we won't rest on this year's accomplishments; we must look to the ongoing challenges; the next property fund raising; the never-ending battle against invasive species and the continuous property stewardship duties that sustains the general health of our 37 properties; and most importantly, the passing of knowledge to the next generations on the importance and appreciation of the natural environment that surrounds us.

And why do we do all this? Perhaps it's a peaceful hike on one of our many trails or capturing a glimpse of an eastern loggerhead shrike on the Carden Alvar. Perhaps it's exchanging smiles and a friendly word with a passing hiker. Our properties are a connection to nature for so many and that is what makes it all worthwhile.

I challenge all of you to explore as many properties as you possibly can this year. They are all so diverse and there is so much to discover.

## Highlights of 2011

#### **Preserving Natural Lands**

• Almost 1,400 acres was brought under protection in the region during a busy year of acquisition efforts by The Couchiching Conservancy and the Nature Conservancy of Canada. Seeking to maximize matching funds available for acquisition in Carden from the Carden Acquisition Fund and the federal government, the two organizations worked together to identify and pursue high-priority habitat for conservation on the Carden Plain. Key properties were added elsewhere in the region.

### Notable in 2011

- The purchase of Bluebird Ranch by The Couchiching Conservancy. The property is a 206-acre grassland directly adjacent to the south end of Windmill Ranch on the Carden Plain.
- The 700-acre North Bear Alvar was purchased by the Nature Conservancy of Canada. The property will help establish a crucial link between the Carden Alvars and Queen Elizabeth II Provincial Park in the north and will be stewarded by The Couchiching Conservancy.
- The acquisition of The Thomas C. Agnew Reserve, an 85-acre property which adjoins the Robert and Emily Fawcett Natural Area on The Trent-Severn Waterway. The purchase was made possible by a part-donation of the property by sisters Joan Berndt and Susan Campbell.
- The donation of a Conservation Easement Agreement on 100 acres in Carden by Lou and Judy Probst;
- The donation of a Conservation Easement Agreement on 300 acres in North Severn Township by Dr. Nancy Ironside.
- The acquisition of a small but significant strip of land to expand the trail system at Church Woods, donated by the Township of Oro-Medonte.

The Couchiching Conservancy took on an important new challenge in 2011 with the launch of the Copeland Forest Stewardship Initiative. At more than 4,000 acres, Copeland is one of the largest intact forests in Central Ontario. Located in Oro-Medonte Township on the edge of the Oro Moraine, it is public land managed by the Ministry of Natural Resources. The Conservancy is partnering with the MNR to lead a three-year project to enable the community to help steward the forest. During that time we will complete a biological inventory of the property and help create a community network which will assist the MNR in caring for this precious natural landscape. With funding from the Ontario Trillium Foundation, we have been able to hire Dorthea Hangaard to coordinate the project and a key role is being played by Conservancy volunteers who make up the Copeland Advisory Committee.

At the same time, the Conservancy continues to focus on the Carden Plain, where numerous stewardship projects were completed in 2011, fencing cattle out of wetlands and creeks to improve water quality and enhancing habitat for Species at Risk. With assistance from The Gosling Foundation, the Conservancy introduced a new "ecological services" program in 2011 to help support the conservation efforts of private landowners in Carden. Called Landowner Payments for Loggerhead Shrikes on the Carden Plain, the program provides funds to landowners who provide nesting habitat for this endangered species. Four landowners took part in the program in 2011 and we hope to expand it over the next two years.

The fight against invasive species continued across our region as aliens such as Dog-Strangling Vine and Garlic Mustard continued to aggressively threaten local biodiversity. Hundreds of hours of staff and volunteer time went into battling these invaders on Conservancy properties.

## **Conservancy in the Community**

- Community support and involvement is an essential part of our success. We are proud of all we have been able to accomplish with contributions from the local communities. Our outreach program this year included:
- Launch of a new website designed by staff from Downtown Computers. This restructured and updated website will help showcase our conservation efforts and allow us to reach a broader audience. Because the website is a content management system, we will be able to include new information from our office on a regular basis.
- Recruiting and training 20 Conservancy Ambassadors; special volunteers who represent the Conservancy at community functions.
- Re-structured volunteer database that will enhance volunteer opportunities.
- The fifth annual Carden Nature Festival, which featured over 100 field trips and workshop, and attracted more than 315 participants.
- Media partnerships with the Orillia Packet & Times and the Lindsay Post, which provided regular information about the Conservancy's activities to a wide audience.
- Partnership with the Community foundation of Orillia and Area to raise money for an endowment fund. For the third year, a major fundraising initiative was participation in the Orillia Dragon Boat Festival held on September 24th. Our paddling team raised \$5,000 for the fund which was matched by Casino Rama.
- Delivery of "Nature in the Neighbourhood", a program designed to enhance nature learning opportunities for children in elementary school.
- Partnered with Parks Canada, Trent Severn Waterway to enhance habitat for turtles at the Washago Centennial Park. A new observation platform was also constructed with the assistance of volunteers.
- Attending meetings including those of the Orillia Naturalists Club, Carden Field Naturalists, service clubs and community groups. We also attended Washago Music Festival, Orillia Canada Day, Orillia Farmers Market, Orillia Fall Fair, Transition Town Orillia, and other events in the region.
- Attending and conducting presentations at the joint Canadian and Ontario Land Trust alliance Gathering in September.

### Managing a strong sustainable organization

Ongoing signals that federal and provincial funding may not be as plentiful in the future as they have been in the past along with a desire to secure the future operations of the organization led to a remarkable response from Conservancy leaders in 2011. Following months of hard work, the Past Presidents Council -- made up of every past president, the current president and two former treasurers – created the Heartwood Fund. An endowed fund intended to support the ongoing operations of the Conservancy, the fund will be built primarily through planned giving with an aggressive target of \$10-million by 2025.

Even before the information package has been delivered from the printers, the fund has \$245,000 in pledges. With such a dedicated group focused on the task, we will keep our promise to future generations.



But managing our current needs in an expanding organization remains today's priority:

A financial audit for our fiscal year (ending October 31) has been prepared by Hehn Trickey Professional Corporation Chartered Accountants and is available upon request;

Our overall revenues for 2011 were \$827,573 and our expenses were \$819,884, leaving us with a net excess of \$7,689.

By Board policy, some funds are held for special purposes. In 2011, we added \$36,668 to our Property Protection Fund and \$10,000 to our Stewardship Endowment Fund held by the Community Foundation of Orillia and Area. Our Acquisition Fund was depleted by \$22,500 to cover the purchase of the Thomas C. Agnew Reserve – a sum which will be replenished in the coming months. Overall, the net increase to reserves was \$24,168.



### Looking ahead to 2012



# The Conservancy Board priorities for 2012 include:

- Completing at least one new property acquisition in Carden which is now underway;
- Completing Conservation Easement Agreements to secure close to 1,000 acres across the region;
- Seeing the Copeland Forest Stewardship Initiative through its second year successfully;
- Developing the next five-year strategic plan for the Conservancy;
- Continuing to implement the Integrated Carden Conservation Strategy to support and expand our gains on the Carden Plain;
- Seek new and diverse sources of funding to support our ongoing work.
