RESPECT
NATURE & OTHERS

Leave no trace, don't take from nature, and keep your dog on a leash so everyone (and the wildlife) can enjoy nature to the fullest. Please pack out any garbage.

KNOW YOUR ROUTE & STAY ON IT

Download a map, and stay on the marked trails. Be prepared for the conditions. Let someone know about your plans.



BE AWARE

Pay attention to your surroundings & changes in the weather. Watch for plants & animals, make space for others.





Grab your bike and join a guided cycling tour of an important watershed within the City of Orillia. You will learn about a hidden gem in our community – Sundial Creek. Discover why this rare cold water stream, a spawning ground for brook trout and a refuge from the urban landscape for many species, needs to be protected and restored.

This will be a leisurely 15-20 km bike ride, beginning at Couchiching Beach Park. We will explore the flow of Sundial Creek, making stops at Grant Wetland Nature Reserve and Wilson's Point Wetland. The route will take us through neighbourhood streets and along the Lightfoot and Millennial trails.

FIELD NOTES FROM AN UNINTENTIONAL BIRDER

When Julia Zarankin saw her first red-winged blackbird at the age of thirty-five, she didn't expect that it would change her life. Recently divorced and auditioning hobbies during a stressful career transition, she stumbled on birdwatching, initially out of curiosity for the strange breed of humans who wear multi-pocketed vests, carry spotting scopes and discuss the finer points of optics with disturbing fervour. What she never could have predicted was that she would become one of them. Not only would she





come to identify proudly as a birder, but birding would ultimately lead her to find love, uncover a new language and lay down her roots.

Julia Zarankin is a writer and self-proclaimed birdsplainer with a particular fondness for sewage lagoons. Her writing has appeared in The Walrus, Orion Magazine, Threepenny Review, Antioch Review, Birding Magazine, Maisonneuve, The New Quarterly, Ontario Nature and The Globe and Mail. She lives in Toronto, ON.

TWO TREES MAKE A FOREST: IN SEARCH OF MY FAMILY'S PAST AMONG TAIWAN'S MOUNTAINS AND COASTS

Winner of the 2020 Hilary Weston Writers' Trust Non-Fiction Prize and shortlisted for CBC Canada Reads 2021, Two Trees Make a Forest is a national bestseller and was listed in the top books of 2020 by both CBC and The Globe & Mail.



A chance discovery of letters written by her immigrant grandfather leads Jessica J. Lee to her ancestral homeland, Taiwan. There, she

seeks his story while growing closer to the land he knew.

JESSICA J. LEE Jessica hikes mountains home to Formosan Flamecrests, birds found nowhere else on earth, and swims in a lake of drowned cedars. She bikes flatlands where Spoonbills alight by fish farms and learns about a tree whose fruit can float in the ocean for years, awaiting landfall. Joyously attentive to the natural world, Lee also turns a critical gaze upon colonialist explorers who mapped the land and named plants, relying on and often effacing the labor and knowledge of local communities.

Park. The Carden Alvar is a rare and unique ecosystem, its grassland, wetlands and woodlands hosting over 230 bird species, 140 butterfly/dragonfly species and 450 plants. The Carden Alvar gained Provincial Park status in 2014 to protect and preserve its spectacular environment.

CORRIDORS CAMPAIGN

The creation of wildlife corridors has become more urgent in the face of a rapidly changing climate. Corridors of protected wilderness matter. These are the bridges for species to move. Corridors reduce fragmentation, which has a big impact on species survival. A UN report that concludes a million species are threatened with extinction, and the fact that many Canadian provinces could become 'climate refuges' for animals heading north to escape rising temperatures. We are working towards creating the starting point of the wildest spaces left in Ontario.

The reality has been reflected in The Couchiching Conservancy's approach to updating its natural heritage acquisition strategy. Working with partners over a span of two years, we have developed the document Conservation Priorities for The Couchiching Conservancy. It identifies several high-priority zones within the Conservancy's coverage area. Through this process, it became clear the importance of the Black River Wildlands region and Carden Alvar.

Mapping was done of Species at Risk occurrences, connection to existing protected areas (with land trusts, Conservation Authorities, parks, etc), waterways, forest cover and more. Consideration was also given for highest threats, protections in place, fragmentation and more.

With increasing development pressure in our area, we are hoping to raise \$1.4M for the Corridors Campaign. As of March 2021 we still need to raise \$500K – so every donation is important and moves us closer to our land conservation objectives.

Your donation to the Corridors Campaign powers the Conservancy in efforts to move forward various protection projects throughout this region.
