

DID YOU KNOW...

Many of the nature reserves The Couchiching Conservancy and partners help to protect have marked walking trails! On-going care of these reserves, including seasonal trail maintenance, is made possible by our members, volunteers and supporters.

- TREAD LIGHTLY
 Visit the reserves for nature app
 - Visit the reserves for nature appreciation and low impact activities. Enjoy 'passive recreation' such as walking, birding, snowshoeing.
- 2 KNOW YOUR ROUTE
 Download a map, and stay on the marked trails. Be prepared for the trail conditions. Let someone know about your plans.
- BE AWARE

 Pay attention to your surroundings and changes in the weather. Watch for plants & animals, make space for others.
- LEAVE NO TRACE

 Do not take anything from the forest, this is poaching. This includes mushrooms, flowers, berries, sticks, etc. Take home any litter you bring and pick up after your pet.
- DOGS ON LEASH

 Do not let any pet off leash. This damages the reserve, and is disrespectful of wildlife and other visitors.

Outdoor activities have inherent risks - use of our trail systems is done at your own risk.

YOUTH CONSERVATION OPPORTUNITIES

The Couchiching Conservancy is offering a new youth community science program that will provide opportunities for local youth (between the ages of 15 and 30) to participate in conservation projects. **The Angela Rehhorn Commemorative Project**, will allow youth to be involved in making roads safer for wildlife and removing fences on the landscape, and will also introduce them to options available for a career in conservation.

This project has been made possible through the Commemoration Fund for the Victims of the Ethiopian Airlines Flight 302 Tragedy, which honours the Canadian victims and their families.

The Youth Stewardship program is made of three core seasonal initiatives, all aimed to protect and conserve natural landscapes and enhance habitat connectivity:


- **Trail Cams**: This is your opportunity to become a wildlife documentarian- your trail camera setup will contribute to the documentation of the reserve's biodiversity;
- Release the Wild: We will guide you through the process of identifying and dismantling harmful fencing;
- Wildlife on Roads: Learn how to document and submit data from observations, helping us identify where wildlife is crossing roads to access nature reserves, whether or not they cross successfully, and how current road design and infrastructure effect these statistics.








This paddle on the historic Black River is led by Phil Careless, Ontario Parks biologist. The route will take paddlers from the Rosebush Landing entry to the foot of Ragged Rapids and back. 

Grab your bike and join a guided cycling tour of an important watershed within the City of Orillia. You will learn about a hidden gem in our community – a rare cold-water stream that needs to be protected and restored. This will be a leisurely 15 km bike ride, beginning at Couchiching Beach Park. We will explore the flow of Sundial Creek, making stops at Grant and Wilson Wetland. Conservancy Board Members Jane Bonsteel and Bob Sullivan will share information about these properties and the biology and history of this unique stream, a spawning ground for brook trout and a refuge from the urban landscape for many species.






! DID YOU KNOW...


