

VISITORS' ETIQUETTE

Nature reserves with trails represent years of conservation work and countless hours by staff and volunteers to protect the landscape and maintain the paths.

There are some simple rules you must follow while visiting:



TREAD LIGHTLY

Visit the reserves for nature appreciation and low impact activities. Enjoy 'passive recreation' such as walking and birding.



DOGS ON LEASH

Keep your pet(s) on leash, reduce the impact on the land and respect other visitors.



LEAVE NO TRACE

Do not take anything from the reserves, including mushrooms, flowers, sticks, etc. Take home any litter or pet waste.



KNOW YOUR ROUTE

Download a map, and stay on marked trails. Be prepared. Let someone know of your plans.



BE AWARE


Pay attention to your surroundings and changes in the weather. Watch for plants and animals, and make space for others.
















Spring ephemerals like trilliums and trout lily's bloom early to soak up sunlight before the forest canopy fills in.

Though they're only visible for a short time, they're vital for supporting early pollinators and forest health.





Every year, thousands of frogs, salamanders, and other wildlife face a dangerous journey across roads near Whitney Wetland and McIsaac Nature Reserve. Vehicle collisions and habitat barriers threaten their survival.



Experience the calming and rejuvenating practice of forest bathing on a 1 km guided walk with certified forest therapist, Beth Foster. As spring transitions to summer, slow down, de-stress, and engage your senses while deepening your connection with nature.



This paddle on the historic Black River is led by Phil Careless, Ontario Parks biologist. The route will take paddlers from the Rosebush Landing entry to the foot of Ragged Rapids and back. Along the way, Phil will intrigue you with interesting facts about the riparian landscape and local species, including one of the most endangered animals in North America. 


